

# MESSAGE FROM LEADERSHIP

---

Dear Friends and Colleagues:

While the Board of Directors and Staff of DVSCP may not have changed the whole world, they have changed our small part of it in some significant ways. And you, our friends, have encouraged those changes by your steadfast support. Your faith in our work drives us toward excellence and an ongoing search for how to improve.

The agency took a hard look at what we wanted to do over the next three years and created a new Strategic Plan, which will guide us through 2021. We are looking at best practices in all areas of nonprofit management. The Board also activated two new committees last year – Advocacy and Programming. Advocacy will work with legislators to improve outcomes for survivors and hold abusers accountable. Program will focus on evaluation of current services, identify gaps, and look for outcome-based prevention programs. Both are critical to the growth of the agency. The Governance Committee brought six new board members on at the Annual Meeting in May – all with a prior involvement at DVSCP and a commitment to serving their community.

We are poised to do a windows/exterior renovation project – the Shelter has been neglected for far too long. Cumberland Design & Building Company, Inc. will manage the work and has completed Phase One – the child care room - which was underwritten by the Carlisle Rotary Club Foundation. The completion of the work will probably start in November. Why is this important? DVSCP’s Emergency Shelter housed 72 adults and 64 children last year – an average of 10 adults and 11 children per month. We were able to relocate 66% to safer housing! Keeping the building in good operating condition is critical.

The Board of Directors created a new award in May – The Karen Shirey Award for Exceptional Volunteer Service. Karen was there as the first and very worthwhile recipient! She has been an advocate and supporter of this agency since its inception in 1990. For 29 years Karen has been a passionate volunteer, serving as both President and Treasurer and as a formidable fundraiser. Her husband, Wil, has worked alongside her for all these years. The agency has been fortunate in its friends, and Karen is chief among them.

The Staff has continued its professional development and commitment to providing services that are trauma – informed and compassionate. We saw a 14% increase in the number of Hotline calls fielded, a 3% increase in the number of Shelter nights offered, and an 8% increase in the number of Protection from Abuse Orders with which we assisted.

We move into our 30<sup>th</sup> year with grit and determination, ready to face the challenges endemic to this work.





# SHELTER REPAIRS

DVSCP has taken great strides to improve the condition of the shelter over the past two years. In 2017, the agency renovated the kitchen, entryway, dining room, living room and child care room. Beginning in 2018, DVSCP started its Adopt-a-Room Program, where members from the local community began making over Shelter bedrooms. Makeovers included painting, removing old carpet, and bringing in new furnishings and decorations. The rooms completed to date are amazing, to say the least. The effort and care taken is immediately evident when entering each room.

The next step in updating the Shelter, which was originally built in the 1930's, is a two-part structural improvement project needed to ensure the safety and comfort of the staff and residents. This will involve repairing or replacing 45 Shelter windows, as well as repairing and replacing portions of the exterior.

Cumberland Design and Building, Inc., a Carlisle-based general contractor, was ultimately selected by the Board of Directors to complete the vital repairs.

The first component entails updating and/or replacing the windows in the shelter as most are old and many are unsafe. The second part involves updating and/or replacing all exterior wood to include trim, fascia, eaves, and dormers, as the wood in most places is either in bad condition or has begun to rot. The agency wants to proactively address these issues by replacing the rotting wood or scraping and painting any salvageable areas.

DVSCP feels very strongly that the improvements described briefly above are necessary for the structural longevity of the Shelter. The Board is committed to remaining in the current facility, and repairing the windows and exterior is critical to keeping the building in good operating condition.

Staff have been working tirelessly to raise the funds necessary to complete the project. Efforts include writing a number of grants, applying for NAP (Neighborhood Assistance Program) funding through the PA Department of Community and Economic Development, and a capital campaign letter, which was sent out in June 2019.





# YEAR IN REVIEW

---

## Supporting Survivors

---

The purpose of DVSCP's ongoing support group is to "provide help and support for each other, identify coping strategies, and problem solve together." Simple guidelines include confidentiality and not giving advice unless it is requested. Group can be a powerful place for survivors to come together, realize they are not alone in their struggle, and begin putting their lives back together. Facilitators use a variety of techniques to encourage sharing – journaling, art work, guest speakers. A recent art project, led by Shelter Assistant Cait Deane, had the group creating a flower; the stem represented the foundation on which they would build their lives; the petals the things they needed to thrive. Facilitators pointed out the look of great contentment and peace on the faces of the women as they worked! It was a great reminder that small things can reap big benefits.

# a great year to VOLUNTEER


DVSCP has more than 40 volunteers who help the agency with many vital tasks. They make up the agency's Board of Directors, assist with fundraising, help survivors navigate the court system, work the hotline, and staff tables at public events. Without this committed group, the small agency staff wouldn't be able to keep up with the demanding work that goes into running a successful nonprofit.

DVSCP was fortunate to be able to recognize three of these outstanding volunteers throughout 2018/2019. First, *The Savings Guide* featured this agency in its first-ever 'Volunteer of the Week' column. Staff quickly selected volunteer Brenda Valek. Brenda has been involved since 2014— leading the Reindeer Food fundraiser, working public outreach events, and even raising grant funds for the agency through her employer, IBM. Her hard work, commitment, and friendly attitude make her one amazing volunteer!

Deb Cornelius was the second to be recognized for her outstanding work with survivors. At the Victims' Rights Rally in April 2019, DVSCP presented Deb with the 'Volunteer of the Year' award for the countless hours she has spent working with survivors during ex parte hearings. Deb has only been volunteering a short time with the agency, but has already managed to touch countless lives throughout our community.

Lastly, the agency recognized Karen Shirey. Karen has supported the agency since its inception in 1990—serving on the Board of Directors, through hands-on service projects at the shelter, and being actively involved in agency fundraising efforts, such as Holiday Happenings and the Annual Gala. In honor of her unwavering commitment and support, DVSCP created the 'Karen Shirey Award for Exceptional Volunteer Service.' Karen was not only the namesake but also its first recipient at this year's Annual Meeting. Surrounded by her family and a room full of board members, staff, and community partners, Karen gave a moving acceptance speech, ending with the following thought-provoking statement: "Don't ever question the value of volunteers—Noah's Ark was built by volunteers, the Titanic was built by professionals."

The value of each of our volunteers at DVSCP is immeasurable and extremely appreciated.

# YEAR IN REVIEW

---

## Educate.

---

While direct service is often DVSCP's primary focus, part of the agency's mission includes the need to educate. Using the momentum that healthy masculinity has provided over the past year, the agency focused on its school programming efforts to reach a combined **466** students between Dickinson College and Carlisle and Camp Hill High Schools with its healthy masculinity workshops. The sessions focus on teaching young men to practice healthy, nonviolent behaviors, as well as to become upstanders – people willing to speak up and take action when others are being abused or treated unfairly. The positive response prompted not only Dickinson College, but also Carlisle High School to invite the agency back to co-present with male athletes from Dickinson. These athletes were trained to facilitate the healthy masculinity workshops by DVSCP's AMEND co-facilitators, Dorothy Andrews and Jason Brode.

Dorothy and Jason are agency veterans on the education front as co-facilitators of DVSCP's AMEND program, a 26-session education program for men who abuse and batter. Offered once a week in Cumberland and Franklin Counties, the program, which began in 2008, has averaged 25 men per class consistently over the past few years. Program participants focus on their use of power and control, as well as alternatives to violence and skills that promote safety, fairness, and equality in relationships. AMEND and healthy masculinity intersected this year when two AMEND participants joined Dorothy and Jason for a presentation to Dickinson College's Sociology of Gender Violence class. Students heard from an abuser, who recently completed the AMEND program. He gave a personal perspective on why healthy masculinity is so important. The purpose of these workshops is not only to raise awareness but to prevent future perpetration.

DVSCP has also teamed up with YWCA Carlisle's Sexual Assault/Rape Crisis Services to focus efforts on primary preventative school programming. Currently, these sessions are being provided at River Rock Academy, an alternative school in Newville, PA. Throughout the school year, weekly classes for middle school and high school students focus on interpersonal skills, healthy boundaries, and social/gender norms. Because these programs have been so successful, the duo was asked to expand services by providing classes to the students at River Rock's Shiremanstown campus.

"Group means so much to us because our students are cared about. They know that they can share personal feelings that will be taken seriously and are able to express themselves in their own ways," stated Hanna Humphreys, Clinical Leader at River Rock Academy.

The YWCA/DVSCP partners are also returning to Dickinson this fall for the second year in a row to hold the "How to Be an Ally to Someone Experiencing Sexual or Intimate Partner Violence" program. Last year the program was a confidential event, which prompted an amazing turnout with students from various pockets on campus.


